FISCAL ANALYSIS

ASSUMPTION

Officials from the **Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE)** assume the proposal would result in no fiscal impact to DESE. At the local school district level, DESE officials assume there could be additional costs to some school districts if additional administrative procedures would become necessary to provide due process to non-certificated personnel. However, DESE officials were unable to estimate the fiscal impact. DESE officials responded to a similar proposal from the prior legislative session (HB 1183) by assuming that while local public school districts would be affected, processes already in place could be extended to apply to removal situations involving noncertificated school employees. Therefore, DESE officials assumed no fiscal impact would be expected to result from the bill from that legislative session. Therefore, the **Oversight Division** assumes no fiscal impact would result from this proposal.

Officials of the **Secretary of State** note that the rulemaking authority granted is not to any state agency; therefore, the proposal would not affect their office.

FISCAL IMPACT - Small Business

No direct fiscal impact to small businesses would be expected as a result of this proposal.

DESCRIPTION

This proposal would require boards of education to adopt rules and regulations to govern appointment and promotion of all employees of a school district. Appointments would be by examination and promotions by length and character of service.

The board would adopt a probationary period for all employees.

DESCRIPTION (continued)

All employees would receive the same due process for removal afforded to certificated teachers.

This legislation is not federally mandated, would not duplicate any other program and would not require additional capital improvements or rental space. The proposal would not affect Total State Revenue.
